

**CALL FOR PAPER
1st PSITS-WV STUDENT RESEARCH PRESENTATION**

The PSITS-WV Student Research Presentation 2017 is organized by the Philippine Society of Information Technology Students-Western Visayas (PSITS-WV) and Philippines Society of Information Technology Educators-Region 6 (PSITE-R6) to enable IT Students in the Region to disseminate their research works and to interact with other student researchers.

Paper Submission

Submitted paper must be a completed research (Capstone Project, Thesis, Research Work), original, and not submitted to a journal or presented to another conference/symposium. Only one (1) paper will be submitted per participating school. Only papers of PSITS Affiliated School or PSITE-R6 Institutional Member will be accepted. Register and Submit abstract to the link provided in the PSITS-WV Website: www.psitswv.org. Abstract should be 200-250 words only, and five (5) keywords should be provided. Once the paper is accepted, a notice of acceptance will be send through email, and a full paper will be required to be submitted. Accepted papers will be published in the conference proceedings, and book of abstracts.

General Guidelines for Presentation

1. There will be two (2) parallel sessions based on the paper category
2. Presentation should be 10 minutes only
3. Only one (1) student is allowed to present
4. The presenter must be in an Executive Attire.
5. The presenter must arrive in the room ahead of his/her schedule.
6. The floor for oral presentation will be equipped with laptop and LCD Projector. The presenter will submit their PowerPoint presentation to the organizer during the registration on day 1 (March 2, 2017)
7. Nobody is allowed to use their own computer.
8. PowerPoint Presentation must be in Office 2013 or earlier version.
9. The presentation will include the following:
 - Complete Title
 - Researcher(s)
 - Institution
 - Introduction/Rationale of the Study
 - Statement of the Problem
 - Objectives of the Study
 - Conceptual Framework
 - Methodology
 - Result of the Study
 - Conclusions and Recommendations
 - Sample Output (Screen Shots Only)
10. The presenter will be informed if he/she has 5 minutes and 3 minutes left to finish the presentation.
11. There will be a 15-minute question-and-answer period after all paper presentations.

An abstract is “a brief, comprehensive summary of the contents of the article; it allows the reader to survey the contents of an article quickly”. It should state the purpose of the research, the main results or findings and major conclusions. The first line of the abstract is not indented. The abstract should not be more than 250 words in one paragraph. It should use single line spacing; font style is Calibri (Body), in italics; font size is 12 points.

Introduction

The full paper submitted for publication shall adhere to the general standards set by the discipline one is engaged into. The length of the full paper should preferably be not more than 6,000 words, Word processed in letter size (8.5” x 11”) paper. There should be no space between two paragraphs. Use single line spacing and 2.5 cm (or 1 inch) margins for all sides of the paper. The font style is Calibri (Body), font size is 12 points. Do not place page numbering. All sentences are aligned to both left and right margins (Justify).

Level 1 Heading

The level 1 heading is Centered, Boldface, Uppercase and Lowercase. Leave a space of 12 points before the beginning of a new head.

Level 2 Heading

Level 2 heading is Flush left, Boldface, Uppercase, and Lowercase Heading.

Level 3 heading. Level 3 heading is indented, boldface, lowercase paragraph heading ending with a period. Your paragraph begins right here, in line with the heading.

Level 4 heading. Level 4 heading is indented, boldface, italicized, lowercase paragraph heading ending with a period. Your paragraph begins right here, in line with the heading.

Another Level 1 Heading

Include in your full paper sufficient details to allow the work to be replicated. Use the international system of units (SI) and include the SI equivalent of other quantities mentioned.

Literature Cited

For papers following the APA style, use sixth edition style in listing the references. Hanging indent should be used for the reference list entries. Arrange the reference list entries in alphabetical order by the surname of the first author or by the title if there is no author.

Arrange your full paper according to following sequence:

1. Title (maximum of 15 words)
2. Author's Name
3. Affiliation (University Name)
4. Abstract
 - 200-250 words containing 5 parts: Situating the topic, chief purpose / objectives, methods, results, conclusions
5. Keywords
 - Discipline of the study, variables, concepts, methods / process, geography of the study
6. Introduction
 - Begins with a global perspective with literature to support the argument that the problem is real and therefore must be studied.
7. Conceptual Framework
 - May contain concepts that underpin the study objectives and methodologies
8. Research Objectives
 - Limit to 3 or 5
9. Methodology
 - Systems' development life cycle used in the study.
10. Results and Discussion
 - Data presentation by objectives;
11. Conclusions
 - Answers the objectives; judgment of the findings.
12. Recommendations
 - Recommendations based on the result and conclusion.
13. Literature Cited
 - format depends on the discipline
